

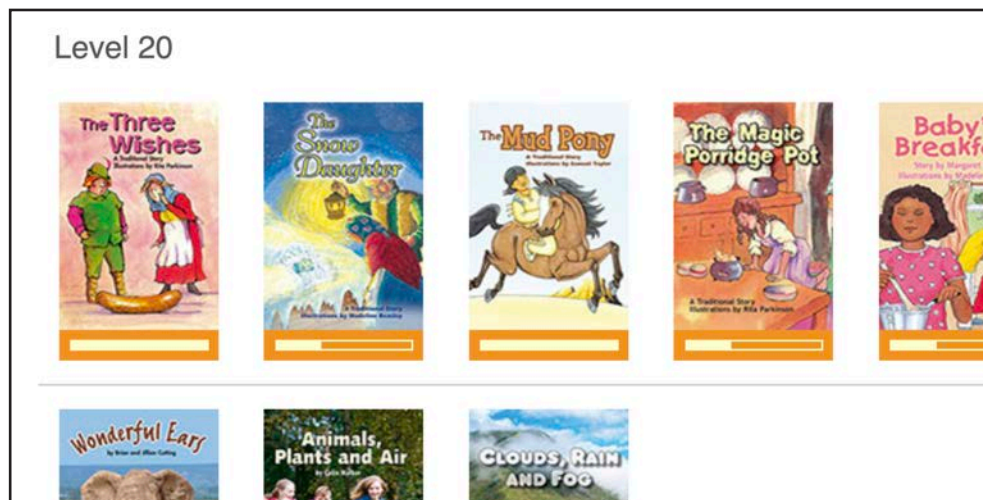
SUNSHINE BOOKROOM

Single Student Subscription Quick Start Guide

1. Log in from the “Student Login” button with your username and password.

2. The single student subscription gives the user access to the complete library of 110 e-books and activities.

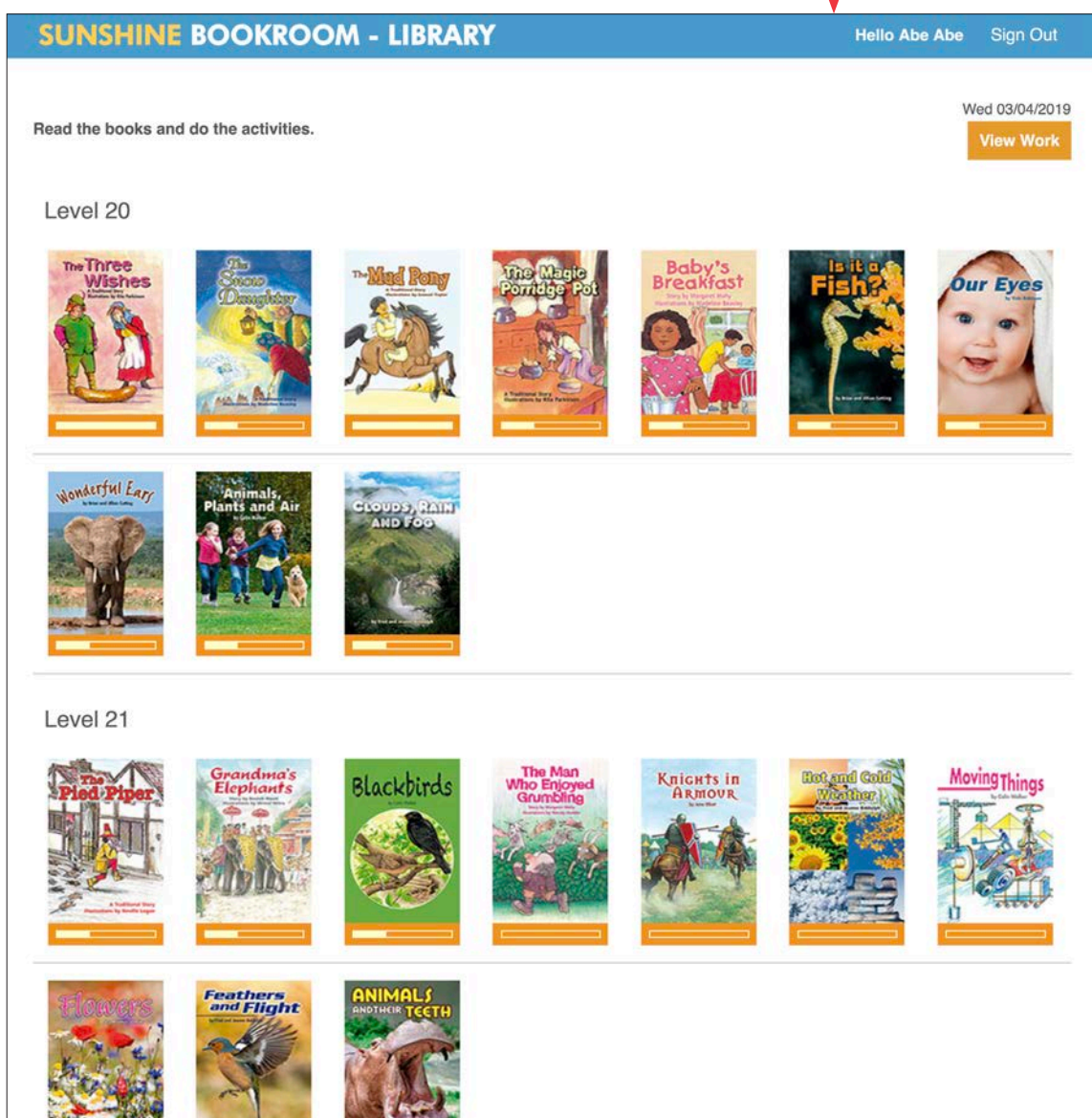
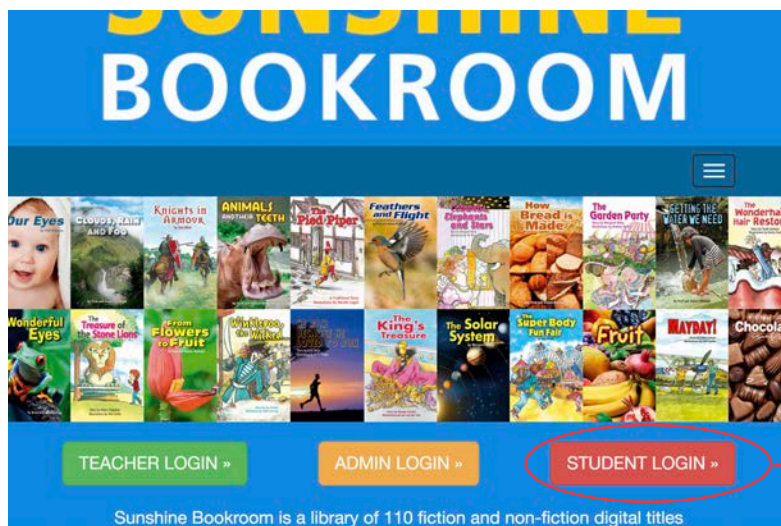


Read the following steps to learn more...

Logging In

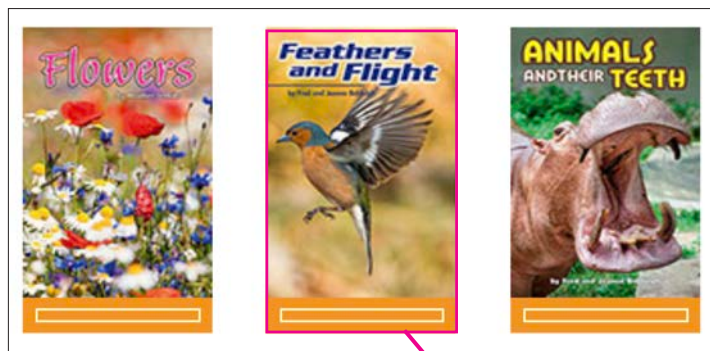
The “Single Student” subscription gives the student access to the complete library of 110 e-books and activities, without any management system. The user can log in using the username (email address) and password that is included in the sign-up email.

Go to *sunshinebookroom.com* and log in from the “Student Login” button.



The E-books

From their Library, students click on a title to download the book and its activities.



Tap or click the text to hear the text read out with highlighting.

Tap on each side to navigate forward or backward through the book.

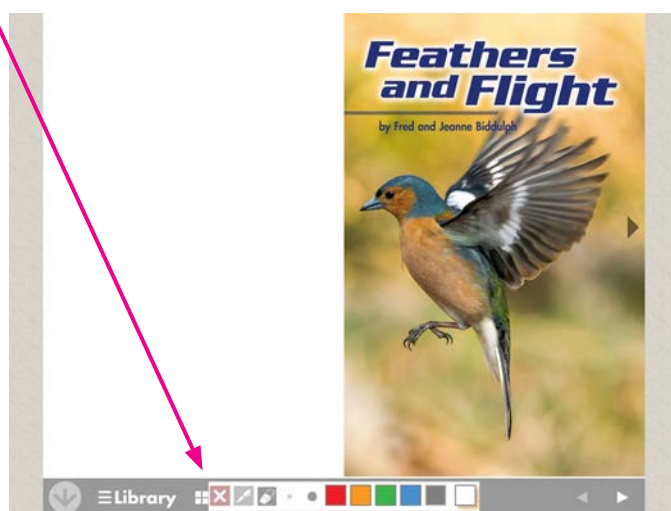
Click **Start your Timer** to get a timed read.

The arrow opens and closes the navigation bar.

These arrows navigate backwards and forwards through the book.

Library takes the student back to their Library and exits the book.

The E-books - Levels 20-30

The student selects the text to hear the page read. The text will highlight sentence by sentence.

Captions and labels are clickable and read out separately from the main text.

The Activities

The Activities menu comes at the end of the book. There are three activities associated with each book - Writing, Thinking and Record.

After each activity is saved, the student will see a message stating that the data has been saved successfully.

The results are saved, and are accessible to the student.

Writing activity

The Writing activity provides opportunities for students to write about their reading and to innovate on the text.

Read Book gives access to the text for reference.

They can save their work to view later or print.


Thinking activity

The Thinking Activity is a quiz that explores the student's comprehension of the e-book. The answer they select is highlighted in red. They can change their answer, but not once they have selected Next.


Body Feathers

Body feathers lie on top of the down feathers and also help keep the bird warm. The body feathers of different birds are different shapes and colours.


Some birds, such as the ptarmigan (*tar-me-gin*), have body feathers that match the colour of the bird's surroundings. This is called camouflage and it helps the bird hide from its enemies.



This male golden pheasant has very brightly coloured body feathers.



The ptarmigan is brown in summer so that it can blend in with the rocks.



In winter the ptarmigan's feathers are white so that it can hide in the snow.

Wing Feathers

The wing, or flight, feathers are important because they help most birds to fly.

Different birds have wing feathers of different shapes and sizes. The wing feathers of an owl have a fringe on one side that helps the owl fly very quietly so it can sneak up on mice and rats.

Feather Care




Feathers get worn and ragged during flying, so birds get rid of their feathers, or moult, and grow new ones. Many birds moult once a year.


To keep their feathers in good shape, birds look after them all the time. They clean them and smooth them out with their beaks. This is called preening.

Some birds take baths in water or dust to clean their plumage.

Jays gather ants and rub them into their feathers to clean their plumage. The ants make a chemical that gets rid of feather mites.

Some water birds, such as seagulls and ducks, put oil on their feathers to make them waterproof. They get the oil from a gland near their tail.
